#### Announcements

Karen Abrahamovitch will teach a workshop on May 11 on her techniques for the state and country quilt patterns she has developed recently. A sign-up sheet was sent around and 7 members have indicated they will attend.

Joanne Lattrell introduced the speaker, Joan Shortsleeve, a Certified Studio 180 Instructor, who spoke on how to "Tuckerize" a quilt pattern. Using Studio 180 tools and technique sheets, one can achieve more precise and often easier piecing when sewing a quilt top.

#### **Business:**

Programs: Mary Neighbours encouraged everyone to sign in to the Sampler Platter on YouTube on April 13 and 14, presented by the Global Quilt Connection and featuring 18 quilters with short workshops. An access code will be sent out next week to all members.

Joanne Lattrell reminded everyone that the speaker at the May meeting will be our own Karen Abrahamovitch.

Challenge Quilts, 2024, are due at the June meeting. Jo asked if there were members that would be interested in displaying quilts at the various venues in the area to fill up the space for display. Some of the displays will be up for 3 months. Quite a few members said they would be interested.

The Billings Museum in Woodstock will have a quilt show for the entire summer. Our CVQ Guild will be featured on Saturday, July 27. Although our displays, demonstrations, etc. have not yet been planned, we will be showing our Raffle Quilt for 2025 in order to sell tickets. Catherine Symchych and Nancy Suarez have been sewing on the Raffle Quilt, and they showed the half of the quilt which is complete. It features Camel's Hump and a Vermont scene.

Quilt Show: The Show will be Friday-Sunday, April 26-27. However, set-up will begin on Tuesday, and takein of quilts is Tuesday evening. Carol Bloomhardt said there is still room for more entries, lots of room with only 28 registered now and room for 50.

The 2 biggest needs are:

Volunteers. We need lots of people to help set-up, take-down, man the admissions, etc. etc. Jo encouraged all members to sign up to make this a successful show.

Tote bags or baskets for the basket raffle. Please donate a full tote, or donate items that can be added to fill a basket or tote.

Nancy said the vendors are all set-up and ready to come.

Publicity is going great. Everyone was encouraged to take more cards and post them. There will be an article in Seven Days. Across the Fence will do a show on WCAX. Jo said there are lots of yard signs for everyone to take and place in prominent spots.

The meeting was adjourned for Show and Tell.

## COMMUNITY QUILTS THANKS YOU- REMEMBER THE SEW-IN ON MAY 17

Thanks to all who have given so graciously to community quilts. Remember we have backing and batting available for you. At guild, check out the table for pillowcase kits. The shed is overflowing with fat quarter-ish size fabric so there will be some available for you to use in any project also. We collect pillowcases for Children's Hospital year-round.

Community Quilts Committee is currently collecting quilts for Camp Ta Kum Ta summer camp. Camp is designed for pediatric oncology patients to give them a healthy "normal" camp experience. "Until there is a cure, there's camp!" The kids range in age from 8-17. Some of them are in active treatment for their cancer. The quilts should be bunkbed size, minimum 50 x 60 or for the teens- minimum 60 x 75. If you have a pet or smoker at home,

please launder your quilt in unscented detergent before delivering it to us. We have exceeded our goal of 35, but there may be as many as 70 campers! Please deliver them to the guild in May or to the sew-in on Friday, May 17 at Yankee Pride 10-2. We will

deliver them before the June guild meeting. Contact Barbara Newman with questions.

Community Quilts has been blessed with lots of fabric and busy piecers, but now has unquilted tops piling up. What's that you say? You do too?! Here's a solution to those problems. Long-arm quilting is faster and easier on the body than quilting on your home machine. In addition to quilting for people, I teach people to use the machine. You may have seen the machine at work on the recent "Stuck in Vermont" episode. A real lesson with me involves a threaded machine and more than a minute of education. You will learn to quilt on a baby or lap-sized quilt, practicing for whatever project of your own you want to quilt. Then, every time you rent the machine you can warm up on a Community Quilt for free, honing your skills and helping us serve the community. Feel free to contact me with questions.
