
February 1, 2011: Joanne Lattrell's Tips & Tools

As a former home economics teacher, Joanne Lattrell, developed techniques to make sewing easy for her students. As a quilter she always keeps her eyes open for useful tools and tips --many of which were originally created for another purpose. So join Joanne in looking at helpful tools and tips to make your quilting easier.

March 1, 2011: Marie Bostwick

Marie Bostwick is a quilter and highly acclaimed author of books about quilters and takes her message to quilt guilds and quilt shows around the country. Once you read her book, *A Single Thread*, you will want to read the others and, like us, won't be able to wait for the March meeting. Put these on your holiday gift list!

Bostwick brings back familiar characters in the second Cobbled Court novel (after A Single Thread), with the focus switching to Ivy Peterman. In fleeing an abusive husband, Ivy ends up in New Bern, CT, where

she and her children find refuge at an apartment complex for victims of domestic abuse. When the town benefactor takes an interest in them, Ivy finds a job—and friends—at Cobbled Court Quilts. The companionship of these women proves vital when Ivy's husband shows up, demanding that she return and, when that fails, accusing her of kidnapping their children. VERDICT A Single Thread focused on breast cancer; here, Bostwick highlights domestic abuse in a story that emphasizes the importance of friendship. Given those themes, as well as the details about quilting, this novel should appeal to fans of women's fiction, especially those who enjoy needlecrafts. A similar title is Kate Jacobs's The Friday Night Knitting Club. Highly recommended.— Lesa Holstine, Glendale P.L., AZ, Publisher's Weekly

April 5-6, 2011: Anne Gallo & Sue Raban

We will be offering two workshops: Quilting the Landscape Quilt (3 hours) and A Quick Peek at Thread Painting (full day).

February Raffle Block McAllister McPuff

Thanks to Georgia Bonesteel, this month I've chosen another 3-D block. While thinking of a type of yo-yo that could become a heart block for Valentine's Day, I came across this through-back idea. Part machine and part hand stitched, this is a stuffed, padded block that is totally finished when the yo-yos are stitched together. Choose three med to dark reds, not Xmas fabric please- and bright white. All pieces should be about 11" square. Also 4 - 4"x4" batting squares.


One 'block' will consist three red yo-yos and one white yo-yo.


Trace or print out the template. Cut out the fabric on the fold, using the solid lines. Sew 1/4'' seams by machine from the center dot to the edge, remembering to back stitch at each end. You will have made a funny looking square 'box' with an open top.

Take a batting square and pin it from the inside on the bottom. Poke it inside out. No need to press seams. Now finger press the raw edge over 1/4" to the inside and pin one each seam. Take a heavy thread, a matching colour, maybe poly/cotton and knotted at the end. Gather with 1/4" stitches all around the edge. At the beginning, gently pull the opening closed. Then take small stitches on the opposite sides of the gather hole. This will tighten the open space and then tie it off. Once you have three red yo-yos and one white yo-yo, hold two together corner to corner. Pin them somewhat flat and whip stitch together. Continue with all the yo-yos and you will have made a padded, squared heart.

Maybe you can machine stitch the units and then have the hand work part to do while sitting by a cozy woodstove. Maybe you will make an extra for a loved one...






The block will be 8"x8" square
