Appliqued Worker Bee Napkins by Hope Johnson

JANUARY RAFFLE BLOCK QUICK CURVED DIAMOND

There will be no December Drawing -- This block is due for drawing at the January, 2014 Meeting

This is an easy and fun block to make, enjoy...

<u>Fabric</u> -- For each block choose a light and dark fabric in the same color family (we used green here).

<u>Cutting</u> − 3 ½ x 6 ½" oblongs Qty 2 of dark fabric Qty 4 of light fabric



Layout - Fold Dark fabric in half lengthwise right sides out
No need to press.

Sandwich dark fabric between 2 light oblongs with
folded edge toward the middle of lights (up in pic)
All raw edges should line up with one another

<u>Sewing</u> – Sew 2 lights together on long edge (1/4" seam) with the folded dark fabric between them
Press away from the dark fabric.



Next is the cool part.

Open the fold of the dark fabric, creating a triangle. Make as even as possible and press flat. Repeat all above for 2nd set.




Sew your 2 sections together along edge with dark triangles. Press this seam OPEN to reduce bulk.

Turn down each folded edge creating a slight curve and topstitch with matching thread.

Add a button if you would like.







As usual, the more you make the more chances you have to win the entire batch. Have fun, good luck at the drawing.

Meet Janet Jaffe, Community Quilts Chair

I am married and live in rural Westford with my husband, 3 dogs, 2 cats and 4, very unfancy sewing machines. I made my first quilt when my nephew was born 30 years ago. It was made of silks, satins and velvets, embellished with appliqued juvenile designs, backed with caramel-colored gingham. My sister-in-law, (who, in her defense must've been 22 at the time) actually *used it as a baby quilt*. You can imagine how long it stood up to the abuse and repeated laundering.

I didn't quilt again until 13 or 14 years ago after we moved from Sausalito, CA to VT. I've made about 35

quilts since then. Maybe 30 have been bed quilts and given as gifts. I completed my last bed quilt over the summer (a wedding gift) and am looking forward to working on much smaller projects.

I'm fearless when it comes to color. Color is not only my starting point, it's how I navigate my way through the quilting process. I am more naturally skilled at design than precision work. Traditional is not a word I would ever use to describe my quilting aesthetic. Very early on, I stumbled upon "Liberated Quiltmaking" by Gwen Marston. Her influence on how I think about quilting cannot be measured.

If I am absolutely smitten with a pattern or an idea, I will occasionally risk boredom and venture into precision work—but not without the support of others! Luckily for me, my guild involvement over the last 3 years and the friendships it's spawned have turned me into a much stronger quilter. You can't go to quilt camp twice a year or sew with Marty most weekends and not learn either the right way or an even bet-

ter way to do things.

As a result of having quilting friends, I've been exposed to ideas and techniques that are causing seismic shifts in my quilting sensibilities. I've learned to use a long arm machine and to do my own quilting. I now find myself considering quilting options as I contemplate (but before I actually begin) new projects. I wouldn't want it any other way.

I also had great fun with a thread painting project and am pondering the subject for my next composition. A quilting project without sewing seams—who knew? There's always something new to learn, to try or to share. Quilting with others has been nothing short of life changing for me.
