

Quick and Easy Bias Tape Demo

A Talk with Gail Babinger and Carol Thurgate about Community Quilts

Tell us the basics of what Community Quilts committee does.

Our main job is to assemble kits that people can use to make a quilt. Then we distribute the quilts to area places. We have several people who help us with the distribution.

Where do the quilts go?

They go to many area agencies including the Lund Home, Ronald MacDonald House, Birchwood, Women Helping Battered Women, the pediatric and oncology wards of the hospital, Cots, Pillsbury Manor, Hope Lodge, Respite House, and we are just going to start delivering to Our Lady of Providence residence.

How many do you deliver in a year?

It was over 200 last year. It will be many more with the fidget quilts this year.

What can guild members do to help?

We have a great need for machine quilters to help us get the tops we have finished and distributed. We always have quilt kits available to help you make a top at home. We can always use people to help us distribute the quilts.

Where do you get the supplies to make the quilts?

Much of the fabric comes from members. (See the Community Quilts article.) We do have a budget which we use to buy the batting and pay for the storage unit.

Tell us about the workshops you hold.

Periodically we have a workshop where we have stations set up so people can cut backing and batting to go with finished quilts, put fabrics and instructions together to make tops, cut and sew bindings, or sew by hand or machine. There's always something for everyone to do. We bring everything you need except for your machine.

Where can we find you at a meeting?

We are always in the lobby along with the others. Look for our red and green plaid bags!

Tell us about the fidget quilt program.

This is a new project we have started. Jane Massenas has posted a pattern on the website, and she and Sandy Hardy are working on kits for people to take home. They are very easy to put together. There's a list of "stuff" we can use in the January newsletter. Sandy will have kits at the next meetings so you can take one home to finish.

Champlain Valley Quilters' Guild Minutes, January 6th 2015

President Marty del Nevo welcomed members and one guest to the meeting, and reminded members to pick up a new list of members in the lobby.

Program co chair Janet Brunet introduced the speaker, Dominique Ehrmann. She presented a review of her interesting quilts and her just as interesting quilt journey.

The minutes of the December meeting were adopted as printed on motion of Rita Bortz and Betty Packer. The next board meeting will be held on January 13th at Barbara Carter's house. A decision will be made about the date for the next quilt show. Whatever is decided, planning needs to start soon and a chair needs to be found. A discussion was held about how to involve more volunteers. Of the members present, a majority would like to have the next show in 2016. There is a need to do some general evaluation of the show situation. A new source of income may have to be found. A raffle quilt needs to be started soon. Janet Jaffe has agreed to look into new places to show the quilt and sell tickets. Connie McDonald will chair a committee to make the quilt. Others will be needed to design and make the quilt.

Carol Thurgate, co chair of community quilts told the story of the appearance of WCAX with Jane Masenas to talk about the fidget quilt program. There have been several requests for quilts, and \$250.00 has been received in donations. A workshop will be held January 23rd when Jane Masenas will help people get started on a fidget quilt. She has posted a pattern on the website. Twenty have been given out so far. Several companies have made donations of fabric. They asked for help quilting several finished tops and showed a new version of the jelly roll quilt.

The raffle blocks were won by June Sweeney. The February pattern is on the website. The Quilts of Valor raffle was won by Josie Moore. The name tag winners received patterns from Dominique. They were Leah Pastel, Marty Del Nevo, Angela Miller, Collette Kaiser, and Betty Packer.

Hope Johnson spoke about the sunflower fundraiser quilt she is organizing. Blocks are due at the February meeting. The Pierson Library in Shelburne wants to display our challenge quilts next Fall again, and the Charlotte Senior Center also wants to have quilts to show.

The meeting was adjourned for Show and Tell.

Community Quilts

The guild received many requests for fidget quilts as a result of the story WCAX did on the fidget quilt project. Thank you to Carol Thurgate and Jane Masenas for keeping up with the requests for fidget quilts during the busy holiday season.

We had a workshop on January 23rd to make more fidget quilts to replenish our supply. Thank you to all who helped cut out squares to be used in the quilts, contributed fabric and notions for the quilts and attended the workshop. Thank you to Yankee Pride for donating the space for us to make the fidget quilts.

Our shed is full to the brim with fabric, kits and other quilt supplies. We will continue to accept fabric and notions to use in our community and fidget quilts. However, we request that the donated fabric for the community quilts be fat quarter size or larger and neatly folded and labeled with the yardage. It does not need to be ironed. If you have orphan blocks you would like to donate, please put them together in a plastic bag. If you are donating fabric and notions for the fidget quilts, please separate the fabric and notions. The fabric donations should be at least 6 1/2" square. We will no longer accept bags of scraps for community quilts or fidget quilts. If the fabric, orphan blocks and notions are organized, it is easier for our committee to assemble quilt kits to hand out to members. Our goal is to keep our community supplied with quilts that can be used by those who need them.

February Block of the Month

Often in February we celebrate two of our Presidents, George Washington and Abraham Lincoln. This year our committee thought it would be fun to focus on one of our Founding Mothers, Martha Washington, by featuring a block called the Martha Washington Star. At first glance some may think this too fussy to do, but work with us here. ☺ I have tried to simplify the directions and even my first time around it took about $\frac{1}{2}$ an hour to assemble. (Took me three times that long to figure out how to tell you about it!) I was really pleased with the result, which I will show you in the beginning. I will follow up with the step by step instructions. Just remember that pleasing results that come when we are careful to cut and sew precisely and on the grain when possible. We have not specified a color way but I did think it would be fun to go with the thought Soft Southern Belle colors. Maybe they will chase away some of that mid-winter drear!



My colors didn't come through very well but are soft teals.

You could use three colors like I did or you could limit it to two colors if you prefer.

Cut 4: 2 1/2" squares Background Color

Cut 1- 2 7/8" square Background Color. Cut once on the diagonal.

Cut 1: 3 1/4" square of Background Color cut on both diagonals.

Cut 4: 4 1/2" x 2 1/2" rectangles of Background Color.

Cut 8: 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" squares Medium Contrast color.

Draw with a pencil a diagonal line on the background of each square. Place the squares one at a time on the rectangle and sew from the lower corner to the upper middle of each rectangle. Trim the outer corner off. Press away from the Rectangle. Repeat this process on the opposite end of the rectangle. Do this four times.



For the Pinwheel:


Layout the $\frac{1}{2}$ square triangles large and small in the pattern as shown. Sew the dark to the light four times and press the seam towards the dark fabric. Place them back in the layout as before. When you have done this four times, sew the two seamed triangles to the larger un-seamed triangle. Sew them in pairs and press the seams of one pair up and the seams of the other pair down. Now place the two pairs right sides together with the seams nesting and sew them together.



Final Layout:



Sew one plain square to each of the two sides of two of the Flying Geese Blocks. Sew two of the Flying Geese Blocks to the opposite sides of the center Pinwheel Block. You should now have three units that will be seamed to make the finished block which should measure 8 1/2" square.
